Israel's Response to the Global Pandemic and its Impact on Children



In April, CHAI launched Zoom briefing sessions with physicians from SCMCI. The briefings provide unique opportunities to hear from physicians at the hospital who are leading initiatives in clinical care and research, solving the mysteries of childhood diseases, and addressing pressing global issues.

The inaugural briefing focused on Israel's response to the global pandemic and its impact on children. Hosted by Dr. Efrat Bron-Harlev, CEO of SCMCI, and moderated by Dr. Philip Lanzkowsky MD, ScD., Trustee of CHAI, the session featured three front-line clinicians who shared lessons from battling COVID-19.

Prof. Elhanan Nahum, MD., Director of the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, described the first days of the pandemic at SCMCI. Dr. Liat Ashenazi-Hoffnung, Director of the Department of Day Care Hospitalization, addressed long-haul COVID-19, and Prof. Silvana Fennig, MD., Director of the Department of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, discussed the pandemic's impact on children's mental health.

The partnership includes developing joint initiatives for the advancement of remote medical care and the exchange of knowledge, consultations, and treatments in Clalit's top medical centers, including SCMCI.

Astronaut Eytan Stibbe visits SCMCI



TAKING MEDICAL RESEARCH TO SPACE

SCMCI was chosen to participate in the Rakia Mission to space, sponsored by the Ramon Foundation and the Ministry of Science and Technology. Astronaut Eytan Stibbe visited SCMCI in preparation for his upcoming trip to outer space. While at the International Space Station, Stibbe will conduct scientific trials that can potentially lead to breakthrough developments in the treatment of leukemia, the most common type of cancer in children.

In close collaboration with the Hemato-Oncology Division at SCMCI, Stibbe will research leukemia cells under sub-gravitational conditions with or without chemotherapy. The findings of the research to be conducted in outer space will be compared with those following a similar study conducted in the Hemato-Oncology Division at SCMCI.

As Dr. Efrat Bron-Harlev, explains, "the results of this study can contribute to understanding cancer cell culture under sub-gravity conditions and add to the way in which new therapies are developed. One goal is to reduce the side effects of existing treatments."









Manelle, a 7-year-old Bedouin child who was born with a complex heart disorder and congenital anemia, was in treatment at Soroka Hospital in Beer Sheba and at SCMCI. A year ago, it became clear to Manelle's doctors that she needed open-heart surgery to save her life. However, the medical team encountered a major hurdle upon discovering that Manelle's blood type was extremely rare (B, RhD negative). Because Manelle would require blood infusions during and after surgery, a blood donor was needed.

Dr. Joanne Yaakobovitz, Director of the Hematology Unit at SCMCI, together with Dr. Vered Yahalom, Head of Blood and Apheresis Services at Beilinson Hospital, embarked on a search for a suitable donor. When no such donor was found in Israel, the national lab team at the Blood Service at Magen David Adom (MDA), headed by Dr. Leora Muncher and Dr. Marina Izak, searched for compatible blood types from the international registry of donors. MDA's Blood Service approached the Japanese Red Cross, which identified relevant donors and sent matching units of blood to Israel.

This past March, Manelle underwent open-heart surgery conducted by Dr. Gabi Amir, Director of Newborn Cardiac Surgery, during which Manelle received one unit of donated blood. Manelle's surgery was a success, and she was transferred to the Cardiac Intensive Care Unit for follow-up care. She received a second unit of blood the day after surgery and was discharged in good health a few days later.

"We at Schneider believe that there are no limits in our efforts to save the life of every child. The mission required multidisciplinary organization, which also included Beilinson and Soroka Hospitals, MDA, the Japanese Red Cross, and international collaboration to save Manelle's life. This story underscores the humanity and creativity of every medical professional who was involved in this case."

The Children's Health Alliance for Israel hosts Dr. Beigelman in NYC



CHAI hosted a June reception in New York City for Dr. Avraham Beigelman, Director of the Institute of Allergy and Immunology at SCMCI. Introduced by Mindy Schneider, Dr. Beigelman emphasized that pediatric food allergy is a serious health condition that has become increasingly prevalent. Equally alarming, food allergy affects the psychological well-being of children and their families.

Currently, no preventative treatments for food allergy exist, and the primary course of management is suboptimal. Dr. Beigelman proposes to establish the Center for Food Allergy at SCMCI to actively cure food allergy. The Center will focus on the assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of pediatric food allergies through oral immunotherapy, lead clinical and translational research, and deliver advanced education to the next generation of physicians. According to Dr. Beigelman, the Center will dramatically improve the quality of life for thousands of Israeli children each year and become one of the leading centers for food allergy treatment, research, and education in the world.
